



Bobby: From washing canteen trucks as a kid to an aspiring coder

"I've been on my own since I was around 12 or 13," Bobby said. "Things weren't good at home, so I left. I didn't have an address. I was homeless, forced to leave school. I moved to Vermont to live with a friend's family and attended Mount Mansfield Union (High School), but that didn't work out."

At 49, Bobby retains his Boston accent and strong work ethic. He started earning his way, washing canteen trucks as a kid in Charlestown, Massachusetts. In Vermont, he



worked on construction sites and in restaurant kitchens. He managed Burlington-area movie theaters before the COVID-19 Pandemic. Bobby is on track to earn his high school diploma in December 2022 and has been accepted to the Burlington Code Academy.

"I started at VAL a few years ago," Bobby said. "I wanted to be a better role model for my kids as a single dad. I wanted to practice what I preach. My life hasn't always been easy, but I'm a stronger person for it."

Hideo: From Japan to Vermont, with interesting stops in between

"I like the freedom in my studies at VAL. No one pushes me." ~ Hideo

Hideo was born in Japan in 1953 as his country was still recovering from the devastation of its World War II defeat. The United States, with fellow Allies, occupied and facilitated rebuilding of this Pacific Island nation between 1945 and 1952. General Douglas MacArthur led the effort promoting military, political, economic and social reforms. It's no wonder that Japan's Constitution contains elements from the U.S. Constitution, accented by decidedly Japanese cultural elements.



Hideo's parents and three older brothers worked to help rebuild Japan's war-ravaged economy. His father and brother were chefs. Hideo spent much time at home with his grandmother, Matsue.

"My grandmother taught me to cook rice and chop vegetables without cutting my fingers," Hideo said with a laugh as he remembered lessons learned in the family kitchen.

When Hideo graduated from high school, he entered an apprenticeship to become a chef. His ambition was to become a chef of French cuisine and he trained for this profession. He dreamed of moving to France to perfect his craft and, after several years' experience in Japan, Hideo asked his chef to tap into his extensive culinary network. An opportunity did open up, but not in France. At age twenty-two, Hideo found himself cooking at the Japanese Embassy in Sofia, Bulgaria, a then-Soviet satellite nation.

"I experienced a different culture, living in a communist country," Hideo said.

When the Japanese ambassador completed his tour of duty in Bulgaria, Hideo returned to work in Japan and, after some time, asked his chef, again, if there might be an opportunity for him to hone his cooking skills in France. Alas, France was not an option BUT there was a job in the United States. Hideo arrived at the famed Benihana Japanese Restaurant in Boston. He was twenty-five years old; he carried one suitcase, one backpack and his prized Chef's Knife. The young chef plied his craft preparing Japanese, not French, cuisine in a kitchen where Japanese was spoken, negating the immediate need to speak much English. Hideo still understood and could read English well enough to become a U.S. Naturalized Citizen.

Now that he is retired, Hideo is studying with VAL ELL teacher Leigh Smith to improve his ability to speak English.

"Hideo pushes himself, to astonishing levels," Smith said. "He has overcome a reticence to study online, and has stretched himself to meet new challenges in reading, writing, and OLC (Online Learning Center) discussions. I have rarely seen a student engage in learning so eagerly, yet with humility, while also encouraging his classmates."

Weatherization had been a long-simmering career interest for Nicole. It checked so many boxes for her: sustainability, social determinants of health, poverty relief, and addressing the inequitable impacts of climate change.

"I was working and looking for a career change," Nicole said. "I had been toggling between environmental sustainability and human services in my search for purpose-driven work. I got on my computer, read about Energy Works, and decided I was just going to apply. I'm glad I did. Going hands on, within the first days, was extremely helpful. It helped me ask myself, 'Can I handle working in an attic or being in a basement for half a day?' (She



could.) It was boots on the ground within the first days and the technical skills—power tools and principles of building design—were so helpful."
